Adults Unaccompanied adults, adults in couples and households with dependents 18 and older. The head of household must be literally homeless (in shelter, a place not meant for human habitation) or in transitional housing	If someone at your organization is trained to conduct the assessment, refer in-house. If not, the Coordinated Housing Assessment Team (CHAT) is the main point of access.
